Today we're going to take a look at the Doctrine of **Election**. Do you know what it is? Would you be able to **explain** it to someone else - perhaps to someone who is **new** to Christianity? Even if you **do** know what it is and you **are** able to explain it, a new-comer to the faith probably wouldn't understand what you're talking about, because the Doctrine of Election isn't very logical. Adding to the confusion, this doctrine has been **perverted** and **distorted** by many church bodies throughout the ages. Some have proposed that election is a license to sin, reasoning that since they have already been **elected** for salvation, then they're **free** to do anything they want with no consequences. Others have concluded that if God elected some for **salvation**, then He must have also elected some for **damnation**. Both of these ideas are **preposterous**, but they do show us that election is a **difficult** subject. However, that's no reason for us to shy away from it. Paul explained it to the Romans in the three verses of our text, and they were the **richer** for it. We too, if we're not going to remain as **babies** in the faith, must also delve into the more complex portions of Scripture, and grow stronger from the meat which is offered there.

Our text is one of those **meaty** portions of Scripture, so it's going to take a lot of **concentration** on our part. I hope you had a good breakfast this morning, because today we're going to be following the Apostle Paul on **A Walk Through The**Christian's Life. As we take this walk, it will be most beneficial to concentrate on two things - the **comfort** of our election, and the **certainty** of our glory. This particular walk extends from before the world **began**, all the way to living in God's eternal kingdom in **heaven**. That's a pretty **long** walk, so let's lace up our hiking boots and get started!

We read, "Those God foreknew, he also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, so that he would be the firstborn among many brothers." Way back before God created the world, He chose us according to His foreknowledge. God foreknew us. That doesn't mean that God chose us because He, in His omniscience, foresaw that we would do good works, or even that we would have faith in His Son. If that were the case, then God's election would have been an election by works, based on what we have done. However, the fact of the matter is that our election is an election of grace, based on what Christ has done for us. Paul wrote later in this same letter, "At the present time there is a remnant chosen by grace. Now if it is by grace, then it is not the result of works - otherwise grace would no longer be grace." Grace is God's love for us - a love which we have not earned, and a love which we don't deserve. God didn't choose us because of our works, but

rather when God foreknew us, He **set His heart** on us - and He did it purely out of **grace**, just because it was what **He wanted** to do. God wanted His Son to have many **brothers**, so He chose **us**, as Paul wrote in the first chapter of his letter to the Ephesians, "God predestined us to be adopted as His sons through Jesus Christ. He did this in accordance with the good purpose of his will." We have been **adopted** as God's children. And as God's children, we are Christ's **brothers**, because He is the only begotten Son of God. We have been chosen **in Christ**, and now we are **His**. Jesus said in His high priestly prayer, "Father, I want those you have given me to be with me where I am so that they may see my glory - the glory you gave me because you loved me before the world's foundation." This is a position of honor for Christ because He is the **firstborn** among His many brothers. He is not only the **author** of our salvation, but also without Jesus there would **be** no salvation at all. What an honor it is for **us** to be called His **brothers**, and to be chosen to spend all eternity with Him in God's **family**.

But this eternal decree of God, established before creation, only marks the first portion of our **Walk Through The Christian's Life**. As we step around the bend we notice that God also carries out that decree in our lives here in **time**, through a number of divine actions. Again we read, "Those he predestined, he also called. Those he called, he also justified. And those he justified, he also glorified." God called us here in time. This calling is not because of our works either. Paul told Timothy, "God saved us and called us with a holy calling - not because of our works, but because of his own purpose and grace." How much clearer can you get? God calls, and we are to hear Him.

But our calling is not only heard with our **ears** - it's also heard with our **heart**. And by God's grace alone, that calling is not **rejected** by us, but rather it is **received**. God changed our hearts and **turned us around**. Peter put it this way, "You were like sheep **going astray**, but you are now **returned** to the Shepherd and Overseer of your souls." This **conversion** didn't come about as the result of some special, emotional, inner call as some believe. Rather, God changed our hearts and lives by means of the **Gospel** in His **Word** and **Sacraments**. That's where the power lies to change men's hearts - **not** in our **emotions**.

But there is still **more** to our journey. God has not only **put** us on the road to heaven, He also **keeps** us on that road. God daily sends us His Holy Spirit to **strengthen** and **preserve** us in the true faith by means of His Word and Sacrament, that we might receive life everlasting. And there is still **more** which God has done for us. He has declared us **righteous** - certainly not because we **deserve** to be called righteous through our own merit, because we have all sinned and fall short of the

glory of God - but rather, He **gives** us **Christ** as our righteousness. Jesus made full satisfaction for our sins through His **sinless life**, and through His **innocent sufferings and death**. God made Him who knew no sin to **be** sin **for** us, **absolving** us from our sin and guilt, and accepting us as **righteous** through Jesus.

During this **Walk Through The Christian's Life**, we've seen how gracious and merciful our Heavenly Father is to us. We've seen how God **chose** us before the world began, and how He **called** us and declared us **righteous** here in time. But there is still one **more** part of the Christian's life that we should take a look at this morning - the **home stretch** - because our text tells us that God also **glorifies** us. In reality, this glory still lies in the **future**, yet Paul speaks of it as though it has already **taken place**. And in a way, it **has**, because God is the one who has determined all these things. God said, "I will choose, call, justify, and glorify these people," and when **God** determines to do something, it is as good as **done**.

The one big question which still remains is perhaps a question which you have asked yourself at one time or another. "Am I one of God's elect?" Martin Luther asked himself that question many times, and as a result, he hated the Doctrine of Election - at least for a time. It filled him with terror because he thought, "If I'm not one of the elect, then I can't be saved." And there were many times when Luther felt as though he was **not** saved. Sometimes **we** feel that way **too**. We ask ourselves questions like, "How can I be sure I'm one of God's elect?" or, "What if I fall away from the faith later on in life?" But questions like these will only fill us with fear. Paul encourages us to **stop asking** such questions, and to simply leave the matter in God's hands. He wrote, "We know that all things work together for the good of those who love God, for those who are called according to his purpose." There is certainty in those words. We know it, because we know our firm and immovable God. And when Paul says that all things work together for our good, he means everything - hardships, trials, even governmental restrictions and potentially deadly viruses. God uses trials for our spiritual good to break us off from sin, to bring us nearer to **Himself**, to wean us away from the **sinful world**, and to prepare us for **heaven**. It's true that at times trials are also used to **chasten** us, but even then, God is treating us as **sons** whom He **loves**. The writer to the Hebrews says, "No discipline seems pleasant when it is happening, but painful, yet later it yields a peaceful harvest of **righteousness** for those who have been trained by it." God's chastening always has a purpose, and whatever that purpose might be, it will always be for our **good**.

So, having that blessed certainty, what should we do when it appears that God has **forsaken** us, or that He is **angry** with us? Should we **wonder** whether we are

members of God's **elect**? No, it would be much better to ask ourselves **this** question, "Do you **believe in the Gospel**?" Some people think that they will be saved whether they believe in the Gospel or **not**. They think, "If I'm one of the **elect**, I'll be saved **regardless** of what I **do** or **believe**." But that's **not** the case. The Bible says that the elect are chosen, "Through the sanctifying work of the Spirit and through belief in the truth." Therefore, if you **believe in the Gospel**, you **are** one of the **elect**, and all the **promises** which God has made concerning His elect apply to **you**. Then you have been **chosen**, **called**, **justified**, and **glorified** - and all things work together for your **good**. When the Doctrine of Election is looked at from **that** point of view, it becomes a great **comfort**, and takes **away** our fears. And that it exactly what God **meant** it to do. Remember, He is our loving Father, stretching out His everlasting arms to catch us when we are about to fall. His comfort is **sure**. Let no one **rob** you of that comfort as you **Walk Through Your Christian Life** here on **earth**, striving to reach your **heavenly** goal. Amen.
