If you've seen the movie, <u>Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade</u>, you probably remember the scene where Indy is standing at the edge of a **cliff**. The room he needs to get to in order to save his father's life is on the other side of a wide **chasm**. The **problem** is that there's **no bridge** across the seemingly bottomless pit. Indy needs to take **A Leap Of Faith**, so he slowly holds his foot out, and then steps forward into the abyss, but as soon as he **does**, he finds **solid ground** beneath his foot. To his surprise, there actually **is** a **bridge** there - a bridge which was painted to look exactly like the **pit**, so that no one would be able to **see** it when they looked down. It's a pretty **dramatic** scene, as anything involving a **Leap Of Faith** usually **is**. Today, we're going to take a look at the story of the Call of Abram, and as we do, we'll see how **his** great **Leap Of Faith** is an encouragement to **us**, for those times when **we** are asked to make **Leaps Of Faith** in **our** lives.

Our sermon text for today introduces us to one of the most important figures in Bible history - **Abraham**. At the time of our text, he was still known as **Abram**. We don't know very much about Abram's life up to this point, and that's really not very important. Who he **was**, what he **did** for a living - how much **wealth** he had accumulated - all these things are **secondary** compared to what **God** was going to do **through** Abram from this point **on**. Actually, this story isn't really about **Abram** at all. It's about **God**, and how He **chose** Abram, and **called** him to be the father of His **special** nation. Here's how that call **sounded** to Abram, "Get out of your **country**, and away from your **relatives** and from your father's **house** and go to the land that I will show you." Abram didn't know **where exactly** this call would **take** him. He only had the command: "Get out." **Following** that command was going to take **A Leap Of Faith**.

Now, if these were the **only** words that Abram heard from the LORD, following this command would have been a very **frightening** thing for him to do. How could he even be **expected** to give up **so much**? How could he know that he and his family were even going to **survive** on this journey? And what about the family he was **leaving behind**? What was going to happen to **them**? All these questions and **more** would have been circling through Abram's brain. But that's **not** what happened, because the LORD **did** say more to Abram - **much** more. God went on to say, "I will make you a great nation. I will bless you and make your name great. You will be a blessing. I will bless those who bless you, and I will curse anyone who dishonors you. All the families of the earth will be blessed in you." God didn't send Abram off into a dark **abyss**. He gave him the **promise** of a **bright** and **successful** future.

When was the last time **you** were asked to take **A Leap Of Faith**? I don't think the LORD has ever asked **any** of us to do exactly what He asked of **Abram** - to leave our **home** and our **family** and go to some **unknown** place. But perhaps we **have** been asked to make **A Leap Of Faith**, and we haven't even **realized** it. Every time we have an opportunity to share the **Gospel** with someone who doesn't know **Jesus**, God is asking us to take **A Leap Of Faith**, and to be a **witness** for Him. Those of us who have been blessed with a **spouse**, have **also** been asked to take **A Leap Of Faith**, by carrying out our God-given responsibility to live as Christian husbands and wives. And of course, if we have **children**, we know that being a Christian **parent** requires taking **lots** of **Leaps Of Faith**. And the list of **Leaps** goes on and on. Should we **move** or **stay put** - should we **buy** a house or **rent** - should I **take** the job offer or **not**.

Sometimes those **Leaps Of Faith** can be **frightening**, and unfortunately, that might cause us to be **timid** - to **hesitate** - or even to **pass up** on an opportunity which the LORD has placed on our doorstep. Therefore, it's important for us to recognize that the LORD is **never** just asking us to take **A Leap Of Faith**. But rather, whenever He asks us to **Take A Leap**, He also gives us the **promise** that He will be **with** us, and that He will **bless** us. Just take a moment to think about all the promises God has made to **us** - the promise to be **with** us and to **bless** us - the promise to always **love** us no matter what - the promise to **forgive** us for the sake of His Son, Jesus - the promise to build up our **faith** as we turn to Him in His **Word** and **Sacraments** - the promise to give us the proper **words** to speak when we're **witnessing** for Him - the promise to **strengthen** us through His Holy Spirit in all our times of **weakness**. These are promises we can **count** on, because they are promises which have come from our faithful **God**.

Now let's go back and take a look at how God was faithful in carrying out all the promises He made to **Abram**. God had promised, "I will make you a great nation," and Abram's descendants became as numerous as the sand on the seashore. And not only were they great in number, but as God's chosen people, they were greatly blessed beyond any other nation on the face of the earth. God had promised, "I will make your name great," and apart from Jesus Himself, is there any name greater than the name of Abraham? All believers are his spiritual descendants. Both the Jews and all the Arab nations trace their human ancestry through him, and nearly everyone else in the world has at least heard of him. How much greater could his name be? And then there is God's greatest promise of all, "All the families of earth will be blessed through you." Through Abram and his descendants, God brought Jesus into the world. And Jesus brought eternal

blessings to all people through His perfect **life**, and His innocent death on the **cross**. Jesus brought full and free **forgiveness** for the sins of the whole world, and there can be no greater **blessing** than that.

Our reading tells us that Abram responded **immediately**. We read, "So Abram went as the LORD had told him." Abram **obeyed**. He was **faithful** to his calling. But it's important for us to know that it **wasn't** because Abram was such a **good person** that he packed his bags, and loaded up his donkeys. His **obedience** was a fruit of the **faith** which God had placed in his heart. The author of the letter to the **Hebrews** tells us, "By **faith** Abraham **obeyed** when he was called to go to a place that he was going to receive as an inheritance, and he **left** without knowing where he was **going**." Abram had a strong **faith** in God's promises. So, at God's command, Abram **went** - and then when he **arrived** at his destination, he **praised God**. Our text continues, "There he built an **altar** to the LORD and proclaimed the **name** of the LORD." Abram knew that it was the LORD who had brought him this far. And he knew it was the LORD who would **continue** to be with him **wherever** he went. It was the LORD that made his **Leap Of Faith** possible.

It's the same God who makes it possible for **us** to take those **Leaps Of Faith** day after day. He hasn't just **made** promises to us. He has **kept** His promises. He sent His Son, **Jesus**, to be our Savior. He has washed us **clean** of our sins. He **strengthens** us through the Gospel. He is **with** us. That's our **reality**. As we trust in our faithful **God**, and believe His **promises**, we are then able to **respond**. We can say **yes** to the **opportunities** God places into our lives. We can carry out our God-given **roles** in ways that are God-**pleasing**. And in the end, **God** is the one who will receive all the **praise**, because our **Leaps Of Faith** are not all about **us** and the great things **we** can do. They are about our great **God** and the things He has done **for** us.

So the next time you are faced with **A Leap Of Faith**, remember **Abram**. The next time you are standing at the edge of the **cliff**, and you are asked to step **out** of your comfort zone and do something **challenging** for the LORD, don't be **afraid**. We can **take** that step because we know that our foot will land **solid ground**. We have the firm promises of a **faithful God** to rely on. And there is **nothing** more solid than **that**. Amen.
